

18:07:22 From Marta Lourenco: Finishing PhDs etc.

18:09:50 From George Mattox : Brazil is also going up right now...We are about to take the UK as the second place in total deaths...

18:10:09 From Isabel Garc \(\hat{a}\): We can't have interns at the museums at this moment so we have to reorganize their work to be online and in September they will finish their internships working with the collections

18:10:40 From Laura Pérez Gil - MAE-UFPR Brasil : Marta, could you explain a little more about these "dirty" and "clean" spaces in storages?

18:14:06 From Marta Lourenco: Sure. In principle a storage is a totally clean space (no pests, everything is clean). But unless you have separate access rooms — which we do not





have in all cases — people have to access the artefacts in the storage, which means you need to create a separate area for quarantine after access. That's a dirty area inside the storage.

18:14:24 From Marta Lourenco: We are quarantining objects for 10 days.

18:15:56 From George Mattox: Interesting. We wouldn't have that problem as our specimens are all stored in 70% alcohol. The problem is to clean the equipment.
