Qualifications for the position

One of my earliest jobs after gaining science qualifications was in a small university science museum. The relationship between a museum and its host university is always a vexed one, but I experienced a transformative moment when, in attempting to design an exhibition, I was faced with the dilemma of selecting a small number of specimens to represent the full sweep of 4.6 billion years of Earth history. This awakened new interests in how people communicate in spaces with objects, what it means for different audiences and how collecting organisations can play a broader societal role.

This was the start of a long career in higher education in both professional and academic staff positions with university museums in four different Australian universities. The work has been highly varied, as is the nature of the sector. It has involved exhibitions, public programs, strategic planning, policy development and curriculum design. In two different appointments, I was successful in securing research funding to develop projects on policies and standards for university museums. I have also undertaken specific research projects on university museums and collections through consultation services.

During my earlier working career I was a member of CAUMAC (Council of Australian University Museums and Collections) and served in various capacities on their committee. This included a period as president that involved revitalizing the group through attracting new members with a series of seminars in different Australian cities. I have

also been the President of the NSW branch of Museums Australia and chaired the national conference planning committee of that organization in 2015 co-edited a volume of essays from that conference.

I have an association with UMAC from 2002 and have been a part of the UMAC Board on a number of occasions, most recently as one of the two Vice Presidents from 2019 to 2022. In the previous mandate I took responsibility for the UMAC Journal and have transitioned it from being a series of conference proceedings to being a journal about museology in higher education. I was also worked to support UMAC's two most recent projects on restitution and return of items from university museums and a project on the pedagogy of the university museum. I have made previous contributions to the development of University Museums Training Week at Shanghai Jiao Tong University and been involved with the organization of recent conferences such as our 2021 joint enterprise with Universeum and our 2018 joint enterprise with AAMG. I have spoken with many groups around the world on the subject of university museums and believe I have a sound understanding of the value they bring to the enterprise of higher education tempered with an understanding of both the history and contemporary dynamism of the sector.

These experiences mean I have a great enthusiasm for the work of museums and collections in higher education and some ability to articulate positive arguments in support of our work.

Main goals of candidacy

I believe the unique institutional setting of the university museum is central to academic – civic discourse and an essential component of higher education's social contract. The nature of collecting in the academy, like the academy itself, is highly variable across the globe. Nevertheless, no matter where you are located, the creative use of collections in higher education can play a positive role in society. I therefore seek, through my candidacy, to support and advocate on behalf of those engaged in such work. While the strategic plan of the next Board will be shaped by the membership, I believe it would be worthwhile for UMAC to work towards the following eight goals:

- Stabilizing and growing membership with a focus on young professionals.
- Continuing to deliver a vibrant, engaging and professionally valuable annual conference.
- Facilitating and supporting the development of regional networks. This should include areas such as Africa and Asia where UMAC currently has few members.
- Improving the quality, reach and recognition of the *University Museums and Collections Journal*.
- Developing a global object-based learning community of practice.
- Promoting and building on the outcomes of previous UMAC projects on restitution and pedagogy.
- Engaging in new projects through creative partnerships with other groups (international committees, national committees and/or groups external to ICOM).
- Building the number of entries in the UMAC database and exploring new functionality for UMAC's online presence.

Qualifications for the position

My museum perspective comes from having had many different career roles, both in heritage and in the private sector. I offer a range of skills and experience that is drawn from finance, project management, start-ups, museums and academia, all of which I use in the course of my work.

I trained as a field archaeologist in Europe and North Africa, excavating and publishing data on prehistoric, medieval, Islamic, post-medieval and 19th century sites.

When based in Tunis, I worked for the National Museums service to study and publish the Islamic period archaeology of classical sites, working with the collections of a range of regional museums across Tunisia and Libya, both small and large. I learned about the perils and politics of nationalist agendas, as they obscured or silenced local interests, and how community and local museums could counteract that force.

I then had a career change into the financial sector, becoming interested in setting up new enterprises and developing the skills needed to help shape and manage start-ups. The people-intensive nature of this sector influenced how I work with and support others to realize their potential, a skill which is becoming essential in the museum sector in this period of change.

When I returned to the heritage sector, I obtained a Masters in Historic Landscape Conservation and a PhD in colonial-Indigenous archaeology, working on sites and collections in both Canada and the US that had lain 'dormant' for generations, and were of increasing importance to affected Indigenous groups. I had an entire second education working with Indigenous knowledge holders, one that has stayed with me as I have deepened my commitment to developing better access to university museum collections that bear witness to the events of the past.

To improve the quality of that access, I focused on making knowledge co-production in the collections more systematic and usable as a methodology, whether with university colleagues and students, Indigenous makers and users, or with interested members of the public. From 2012-2018 I progressed this vision as Director of a major programme of university engagement at the Ashmolean Museum (Oxford). The programme aimed to make collections study a part of the mainstream university curriculum, advocating for the use of museums as powerful intellectual resources — _on a par with libraries and archives — _by providing evidence of successful academic adoption and excellent student results. I shared our work at international conferences and workshops, and was enriched by learning about local perspectives and priorities all over the world.

As Head of Collections and Curatorial at The Hunterian, University of Glasgow, I now have a great opportunity to understand the common collecting histories of a full disciplinary spectrum of museum collections, working with both science and humanities curators. I am more than ever convinced of the power of university museums to make their collections address the societal issues facing our universities, the desires of our many stakeholders, and those whose voices remain under-represented in our collections.

Main goals of candidacy

I am applying for the position of Vice President on the UMAC Board because I believe I can make a significant contribution to widening the impact of UMAC's work in the university museum sector. I firmly believe that any investment we make in widening access to good practice must be shared with our community, working together to clearly communicate our value to both university and to society. It is this combination of action and advocacy that I wish to bring to UMAC as it continues to focus on the quality and reach of its programming.

UMAC is in a unique position to influence how university museums can participate in conversations about knowledge creation, control, sharing and access. The university museum is aligned with its parent organisation's identity and aims, but it also can push beyond, to positively expand the university's reach, and to act as a bridge that connects knowledge production in the university with a wider set of stakeholders and affected communities.

I see my UMAC goals as follows.

- Changing the perception of university museums from a storehouse for treasures, to a dynamic partner in
 mobilizing intellectual and societal change. This has been my professional mission in senior museum roles
 at both Oxford and Glasgow. I have built strategic experience at Board level to successfully communicate
 the special role that university museums play in being the creative, experimental, and intellectually rigorous
 face of a traditional institution. UMAC should be playing a leading role in marshalling global evidence to
 broadcast the value and reach of the sector.
- Contributing to the development of new museum methodologies and theoretical frameworks for
 collections use, especially in the area of cross-disciplinary research and teaching. In our sector, there
 numerous success stories of collections teaching programmes, each special and unique: however, in order
 to make this work truly sustainable, we need to offer our collaborators a set of common principles and
 approaches to knowledge co-production, so that the museum is also understood on academic terms. My
 professional interest in this area is long-standing, having published and taught collections practice and

- theory. I have also worked with community stakeholders to develop theoretical approaches to reinterpreting and revitalizing collections of under-represented groups.
- Commitment to establishing open and equitable ways of working across UMAC regions, to encourage the creation, sharing, and 'return' of knowledge about the past. The 'decolonizing' mission is perhaps the most challenging that museums in both the Global North and South now face, and one which UMAC can play an important supporting role. UMAC should open itself further to scrutiny and power-sharing, and act as a model for decolonial practice for the university museum sector. To de-center its practice, for example, it can lead with changing the editorial power structure of the UMAC Journal to welcome topical thematic issues created and produced by regional members, for example in Africa and Asia.

Qualifications for the position

I am passionate about the potential of University Museums and Collections (history / research / teaching/ museums / galleries / the potential of all those objects) and have over 18 years' experience in university museums, teaching and research collections, art galleries and sector committees and would very much like to extend that experience internationally. Over this time, I have been fortunate to develop a far-reaching network with the industry locally, nationally and internationally.

Committees and experience of relevance here include:

- 1) AMaGA NSW previous state secretary (Australian Museums and Galleries Association)
- 2) CAUMAC current national secretary (Council of Australian Museums and Collections)
- 3) MUMAC current chair for the Macquarie University museums and collections group
- 4) I am currently on the planning committee for the 2023 UMAC Conference at the University of Sydney's Chau Chak Wing Museum in Australia
- 5) I have worked in and for various types of university museums and collections. This includes modern Australian social history; ancient cultures predominantly Egyptian, classical Greek and roman; ancient numismatics; sport; psychology; contemporary art; libraries and archives. So, I have exposure to a variety of types of collections and museums and the issues often faced in the university context.
- 6) Academically, I have taught into museum studies programs at Macquarie University and Sydney University in units as diverse as artefact studies, collection management, and museology of natural history; as well as AU-based and international internship programs. The mentorship I was able to provide for these enthusiastic people at the start of their careers was, and continues to be, very satisfying. Grant and research projects I have been involved in have mainly focused on object-based pedagogies and lifelong learning in the museum context. A current research project is focused on the value of art and social history objects for people living with dementia, we are currently running a pilot where we visit the nursing homes with a selection of objects and artwork (previously patients would visit the art gallery at the university gallery).

7) My education at undergraduate (BSc with BA) level was focused on museum studies, paleontology, Indigenous studies and history. My Honors research focused on the impact of a specific museum policy targeting Indigenous issues which was conducted in the Department of Indigenous Studies. My PhD expanded on issues of representation in the museum setting, this was with the discipline of Museum Studies, which was in the then Department of Environment and Geography.

Main goals of candidacy

I have been the Zoology Collections Manager for over 25 years, and since five years I am also the Sciences Research and Educations Coordinator of the newly erected Ghent University Museum. Biographical note

Dr Paul Donnelly is Deputy Director of the Chau Chak Wing Museum in charge of curatorial and exhibitions. He had many curatorial roles for over 20 years at the Powerhouse Museum (MAAS) in Sydney. Paul has a B.A. (Hons) from the University of Sydney, and an MA in Applied History from the University of Technology, Sydney. His PhD from the University of Sydney focused on ancient ceramics of Western Asia and has published widely in archaeology and design. He is an active archaeologist working in Jordan and Greece. In 2017 he attended the Getty Museum Leadership Program in Los Angeles. Link to CV.

Qualifications for the position

I started at the University of Sydney nearly 7 years ago specifically to play a leading role in the preparation and execution of the new Chau Chak Wing Museum building, and its diverse exhibition program within. In 2020 the Chau Chak Wing Museum opened as the new purpose-built home for collections previously housed separately in the Macleay Museum, Nicholson Museum and University Art Gallery. The 8000sqm A\$66.2M landmark building is a significant addition to Sydney's cultural life, providing state-of-the-art facilities for the enjoyment, teaching, and research of objects spanning art, antiquity, humanity, natural history, and science. More than 120,000 people visited the Museum in the first year. In 2021, more than 17,000 students and staff participated in object-led teaching, including many disciplines which had never used museum objects for teaching.

As the Associate (from 2019 Deputy) Director I oversaw the exhibition program and lead the curators in the development of what became 18 exhibitions and a further number of future changeovers scheduled for 2021 to 2024. My participation in the building of the Chau Chak Wing Museum involved detailed interrogation of the building design, the designs of its exhibitions, and all their budgets.

Strategically I advocated for the employ of four different design firms that enabled closer interrogation of allocated budgets, ensured the quality involvement of the principals of each of the firms, while eventuating in a variety of tempos, styles, and moods to the benefit of audiences. The project came in under the original budget of A\$66.2M set in 2015 – a rarely seen occurrence at the University. In my work I have ensured I remain up to date with museological developments and the social changes of the past few years. I curated 'Object / Art / Specimen', the

introductory exhibition at the Chau Chak Wing Museum, through thematic groupings of diverse objects that avoids hierarchy and the privileging of Western art.

I bring to the UMAC Board over 30 years in museums of diverse collections. The University of Sydney's cultural and scientific collections include: the largest and best quality antiquity collection in Australia with strengths in ancient Egypt and Greece; the earliest known Aboriginal bark paintings; an historic entomology collection dating to the 1790s; Pacific cultural material; historic photographs; Australian post-impressionist painting, and modern and contemporary art. The range of objects impressively encompasses a diversity of natural phenomena and human achievement spanning millennia and the globe. Prior to my role at the University of Sydney is more than 20 years' experience at the Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences (Powerhouse) in Sydney where I worked in curatorial roles interpreting collections spanning decorative arts and design, science, engineering, fashion, architecture, and social history.

This long experience with diverse collections precludes me from privileging one collection over another which as a UMAC Board Member provides me with objectivity and respect for collections of all types. I revel in the often-surprising interconnectedness and relevance of diverse collections and the tangible, frequently profound and emotive, connections they provide to people, places, and events.

Main goals of candidacy

I would like to instigate an international program I am calling 'Collective Collections' constituting a formalised structure promoting collaborative sharing of collection items between Universities.

I am dedicated to, and believe in, the value and mission of university collections and their strengths in inspiring and instructing students, staff, and the broader public. University museums are unique resources of superb quality and diversity able to raise the profile of their institutions while substantially adding to the student experience and adding to the well-being of the community. The broadening horizons of the modern world have never been more in tune with these University collections and their powerful role in interdisciplinary teaching and learning. Concomitantly, there has never been a better time for university collections to leverage their strengths and diversity to the benefit of their own relevance and their multiple audiences.

University collections are in an increasing position of relevance and accessibility. Imagine, however, these University collections supplementing their holdings through access to objects, art, and specimens not otherwise represented in their collections? Through strategic and supportive collaborations under 'Collective Collections', university museums and galleries could maximise their opportunities and impact through the sharing and lending of short and long-term loans. Through such a program, university museums will be able to strengthen their relevance and democratise their relevance and democratise their collections by reducing privilege and increasing accessibility. 'Collective Collections' can be a decolonising tool that subverts the notion of ownership and promotes Universities as truly universal.

'Collective Collections' at its fullest potential can place university museums and galleries at the forefront of a different paradigm that changes our idea of what constitutes a museum.

Main goals of candidacy

Wenjia Qiu is currently the international collaboration coordinator and the assistant to museum director at Qian Xuesen Library & Museum, Shanghai Jiao Tong University. She was in the UMAC Board (2019-2022) as secretary. She had an education background in English Literature and Social Policy. As an emerging museum professional, she has worked extensively in the university museum sector, within China and in the globe. Link to CV.

Qualifications for the position

I have worked as secretary in UMAC Board (2019-2022). In the past mandate, I supported all goals and activities to the Board, especially the President. During the mandate as UMAC Secretary, I think my achievements are two-fold:

- Internally I'm responsible for the maintenance of UMAC's daily operation. That includes duties to keep constant connection with ICOM Secretariat about UMAC membership, to answer queries of new members and to confirm membership for members-only activities. I also take charge of the updated mailing list UMAC-ML and meeting minutes within the Board, and to keep an archive of activities of this mandate. A Chinese social platform, UMAC WeChat, was also under my supervision to update with the latest UMAC news activities and research. All these jobs are to expand UMAC as a global community under ICOM and to increase the communication between UMAC members.
- Externally I supported the Board to expand collaboration with university museum associations around the world and to empower university museum professionals through training, collaborations and webinars. To cite specific projects, I coordinated UMAC's first online annual conference with Universeum in September 2021, and UMAC Post-Lockdown Series webinar in June-July, 2020.

As a young professional, I'm very fortunate to get engaged with UMAC Board and was selected as UMAC Secretary to make my contributions. If UMAC teaches me how to engage and collaborate with university museums in the global context, my daily job in Shanghai has enabled me to observe and build connections in a local and regional perspective. It is situated in China, and more broadly in Asia. I have worked nearly nine years in one of the best university museums in China as a museum educator and the assistant to the museum director. As my University is the secretary organization of the National Educational Alliance of University and College Museums in China, as well as the co-founder institution of Shanghai Educational Alliance of University and College Museums, I have coordinated series of activities and research projects about China's university museums. Since 2019, more attention has been given to the regional collaboration. I have undertaken student programs with university museums in Hong

Kong, and have initiated connection with University Museums Association of Kyoto and the Taiwan Association of University Museums.

I have also established a partnership between my museum with UMAC to develop the flagship project University Museums Training Week Shanghai (UMTWS), which takes place every April since 2017. UMTWS is the only regular international training program targeting university museum professionals and researchers. Nearly one hundred participants from mainland China, Hong Kong and Japan have benefited from the training. It also directly yields to an evident increase of Chinese university museum members in UMAC and more collaborative projects between UMAC and other university museums in China.

Main goals of candidacy

My first mandate in UMAC board is mainly to support the entire Board and the UMAC community as a whole. That entails a lot of coordination and practical daily routines. Several objectives, however, were not successful during my last mandate. These are:

- -to increase more members from China, or more broadly from Asia
- -to explore more research possibilities about university museums

Therefore, if I'm elected to the next mandate, I will focus on: 1) first mandate unsuccessful objectives 2) support the new Board and the new Chair to achieve UMAC's robustness and sustainability.

Develop the objectives for the next mandate:

- -to expand membership with a focus on younger professionals in China
- to facilitate and support the new Board to increase UMAC visibility in regions like Asia and Africa, where members are few.
- to continue the UMTWS and explorer the possibility of establishing an online platform to open all the past UMTWS teaching resources to researchers and the public.
- adapt UMAC project P-MUS into the context of China. Project P-MUS: Professionalising Museum Work in Higher Education: A Global Approach (2017-2019) is a UMAC research project taken years ago. Data about Chinese university museums were not collected sufficiently back then. A further study into this is needed.
- to explore more research possibilities about the theme of university museums' third mission.

To accomplish the above goals, it's extremely important for me to align with the new Board and new Chair's mandate, to support them with concrete and detailed implementation.

Biographical note

Ke Zhao is the director of the Electronic Science and Technology Museum (ESTM), University of Electronic Science and Technology of China. He led a team to complete the preparation and construction of the ESTM, the first museum about electronics in China.

He is also an associate professor and teaches the History of Electronic Science and Technology course. He received Ph.D. in Microelectronics and Solid-state Electronics. His field of interest includes university museums and history of science and technology. He is the vice-president of the Chinese Committee on History of Scientific Instruments. <u>Link to CV</u>.

Qualifications for the position

• Demonstrated strong leadership and managerial skills

In 2015, he led a team at the University of Electronic Science and Technology of China to prepare and complete the Electronic Science and Technology Museum. It is the first electronic museum in China and has now been selected as a National Science Education Base in China. In cooperation with UMAC, he led a group to develop the UMuseum app for the university museum database based on UMAC's Worldwide Database.

• Interdisciplinary educational background and work experience

He earned his B.S. in Biomedical Engineering, his M.S. and Ph.D. in Microelectronics and Solid-State Electronics, and has worked in the university museum field for almost ten years. He exercises a fusion of thinking from disciplinary backgrounds, which fits that university museums are the best platform for interdisciplinary learning and practicing. He organized the "MUSEUM + CLASS" project in our museum. Thirteen courses of four categories, including discipline history courses, introduction courses, engineering technology courses, and engineering ethics courses, join the project. All the courses are taught in the museum or in the storage room, with collections and research results of ESTM. They provide a new way of thinking about the history of science and technology for students from different majors.

Experienced in UMAC working groups

Since 2019, he has worked as the co-chair of UMAC FUTURES, a group of young scholars in the university museum community. He started and moderated the IMAGINATIONS project, a series of online conversations with young

professionals. There have been eight episodes from the Czech Republic, UK, Serbia, Argentina, Japan, Australia, Senegal, and Brazil. Videos of the project are available on the UMAC YouTube channel. It is a project that makes young professionals' voices heard.

Ability to coordinate regional and network cooperation

He organized the Western University Museums Seminar in Chengdu, China, building a regional micro-network with nine university museums. UMAC President Marta attended the seminar to introduce UMAC and the development of university museums. He hosts the seminar annually. He is elected the vice-president of the Chinese Committee on History of Scientific Instruments, being able to coordinate cooperation from scientific and industrial museums in China.

• Global perspective of university museums

He has conducted field research and interviewed directors and professionals in university museums, including Portugal, Spain, the UK, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Italy, the Czech Republic, and China. He has also traveled to Canada, the USA, Japan, Cuba, and other countries to learn about the development of university museums in depth.

Main goals of candidacy

- To better develop the UMAC FUTURES and get more young professionals involved I will spread the IMAGINATIONS project more widely and interview more young professionals to share their work and research. A long-term mechanism will be established for young professionals to communicate with each other online and in person. I will organize a seminar annually for young professionals, providing the opportunity to participate in at least one academic or work event. I will use social media, websites, and other media to post young professionals' achievements. It will help interest more to join the construction of our global university museum community.
- To enhance network connection with digital technology and upgrade the mobile database UMuseum app I will improve and upgrade the UMuseum app to make it easier to access. The new version will provide a section to display brief introductions and links to new exhibitions from the university museum community. Also, some sections to stimulate online communication among members within UMAC will be designed. More UMAC resources section will be added to the app for easy access.
 - To expand the impact of UMAC

I will host regular seminars based on the already formed network of the Western China University Museums Network. It will expand the UMAC's impact in China. In addition, I will try to promote more collaboration between UMAC and science and industrial museums in China if needed.
