

**PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR PERIOD SEPTEMBER 2024 TO NOVEMBER
2025**

BOARD MEETINGS

The UMAC Board met three times online during this period on 02/12/2024, 16/07/2025 and 29/09/2025. Other business of the board was conducted via email. The Board was only required to vote on expenditure proposals that were outside the general agreed approach of spending the equivalent of the annual ICOM subvention on support for annual meetings, usually in the form of bursaries for attendance (paid as reimbursements) after application through a competitive process.

Board members Giovanni Vitelli, Fatemeh Ahmadi as Vice Chairs, Gina Hammond as Secretary, Dominick Verschelde as Treasurer and the Ordinary Members Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza Varón, Sian Tiley-Nel and Margarita Guzman all contributed to the work of the Board both inside and outside of the meetings. Margarita Guzman resigned from the Board on July 6, 2025. The bylaws allow for the appointment of a voting member when an elected member resigns. Margarita was replaced by Zhao Ke, already a coopted non-voting member of the Board through his work with Chairing the UMAC Futures Working Group.

All three Ordinary voting members have provided individual reports (see below).

CONFERENCE

The conference with the title of “Shaping Transformation. University Collections in a Changing World” was held from September 24th to 29th, 2024, at the Technical University of Dresden. Colleagues from over 40 countries and all parts of the world came together at TU Dresden for this joint annual conference of ICOM-UMAC and Universeum European Academic Heritage Network, to discuss the impact of transformation processes on university heritage. The theme attracted a rich collection of diverse presentations focussed on the idea of agency within the professional workforce of university museums and collections.

This was the second time that UMAC and Universeum had held a joint conference. The first occasion was during the Covid pandemic in 2021 with the theme “New

Opportunities & New Challenges in Times of COVID-19” from the 1st-3rd of September 2021. The 2024 meeting was therefore the first opportunity for the two groups to meet face to face. The conference was in person only, although keynotes were livestreamed.

There were 264 delegates, 3 pre-conference workshops, 2 keynotes, 3 roundtables and 116 lectures and poster presentations. Two exhibition openings and over 20 collection visits, tours and excursions. The conference was jointly organised by TUD Dresden University of Technology, Office for Academic Heritage, Scientific, and Art Collections, ICOM-UMAC and the Universeum European Academic Heritage Network. Conference Patron was the Minister-President of the Free State of Saxony.

The conference was financially supported by Gesellschaft von Freunden und Förderern der TU Dresden e.V. (Society of Friends and Sponsors of TU Dresden), the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF) and the Free State of Saxony as part of the Strategy of Excellence, led by the German Federation and States, Sächsisches Staatsministerium für Wissenschaft und Kultur (Saxon State Ministry of Science and Culture), Gesellschaft für Universitätssammlungen e.V. (Association for University Collections), Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft and ICOM Germany

The Lord Mayor of Dresden was a conference supporter, conference partners included Dresden University of Fine Arts, Dresden State Art Collections – Albertinum, the coordination Centre for Scientific University Collections in Germany, Saxon State and University Library, Dresden, the International Centre for Pietism Research, Halle and the ERASMUS+ Project “Teaching with Objects”. UMAC’s financial contribution to the conference covered a range of bursaries plus public transport costs and keynote support.

We commend the high quality of conference sub-themes and the excellent work of the Organising Committee coordinated by TUD Dresden. This was viewed as a highly significant event providing the opportunity to reconnect with Europe after the significant 2023 Asia Pacific conference in Australia attracted little European participation. It was the first time UMAC held a conference in the Federal Republic of Germany and an opportunity to acknowledge Cornelia Weber, UMAC’s second Chair, who attended the conference. Conference participants were mostly European with over 60 from Germany.

There was a combined Universeum UMAC meeting for the Teaching with Objects group and a separate Working Group meeting for UMAC Futures.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership grew by 82 over the period of this report. Most recent figures prior to reporting identified 617 members consisting of 512 individuals and 105 institutional members.

Over the period of the current mandate (2022-2025) UMAC's membership has grown by 50%. Most of this increase is a growth in membership from outside Europe. Numbers of European members have increased overall despite their overall percentage decreasing. There has been a general rebound in membership across ICOM post-pandemic, but UMAC has been one of the fastest growing ICs (data from 2025 SAREC analysis).

UNIVERSITY MUSEUM LEADERSHIP FORUM

The Qian Xuesen Library and Museum at Shanghai Jiao Tong University recommenced their international meetings in partnership with UMAC for the first time since the pandemic. There was also a ceremony for the redevelopment of the museum exhibition space that attracted dignitaries from the Chinese higher education and museum sectors. UMAC was the only international organisation invited to the event in recognition of our earlier partnership that delivered training workshops for participants.

The Leadership Forum was a new outcome with leading Chinese and international speakers. The UMAC Chair gave a keynote entitled "Contemporary global challenges and opportunities for university museums. The program was moderated by Li Fang, Executive Director of the Qian Xuesen Library & Museum. Following the two day forum (December 11 and 12) there have subsequently been plans for a special edition of the UMAC Journal.

UMAC AWARD

The winner of the UMAC Award for 2024 for their project "Curating Discomfort" was the Hunterian Museum, the announcement was made during the 2024 conference. The UMAC Board revised the rules of the Award entry in 2025 to make the nomination process simpler. The UMAC Award has grown in popularity with 20 entries in 2025. The Board is grateful for the wonderful work done by Akiko Fukuno with the support of our Secretary, Gina Hammond, in coordinating the call, reviewing submissions and communicating with a dedicated group of judges who analyse the entries, identifying the finalists, compiling communications about the finalists projects, using this material through UMAC's social media and organising the announcement of the winner.

PUBLICATIONS

The Abstracts volume of the Journal (16 2) was published just before the Dresden conference.

"STEM in the Art Museum: Innovative Pedagogies for the 21st-Century University" was a thematic issue of the journal (16 3) was published late in 2024. This issue was guest edited by Liliana Milkova and Jodi Kovach and featured a number of papers on creative pedagogies developed in the art museum to support higher education programs in the sciences. The issue consists of 10 papers covering chemistry, geoscience, neuroscience, computer science and medicine. The thematic thread focuses on

activating art's capacity to stimulate reflection in a way that strengthens discipline specific skills. The issue has subsequently featured in several seminars and workshops introducing UMAC to new audiences.

The first issue for 2025 was another thematic issue, this one a final outcome from an earlier SAREC funded project on Restitution and Return from university museums. This project was a part of an earlier UMAC decolonisation program. Articles mostly consist of case studies written from two distinctive viewpoints namely the university and communities of origin. The issue is entitled “Beyond Provenance Research: Restitution and Return from University Museums” and was edited by Steph Scholten, Andrew Simpson and Gina Hammond. It consists of 6 case studies from different parts of the world, covers human remains and cultural material, and the volume is foregrounded by UMAC official guidance document that resulted from the project.

At the time of writing, the full draft of the UMAC program for Dubai is almost ready for publication. This abstracts volume (17 2) covers all the presentations in the collaborative sessions with NATHIST, CIMUSET, CIPEG and our International Committee's Day at the American University of Sharjah.

While the number of UMAC Journal issues has increased to 3 per year, we also published the first issue in a new series – “Teaching With Objects”. This is intended to build resources for the new Teaching with Objects collaborative Universeum UMAC Working Group (see below). TWO 1 represents the proceedings from the Knowledgeable Object Symposium. It was edited by Eve Guerry, Jane Thogersen, Gina Hammond and Andrew Simpson.

COMMUNICATIONS

Posting news and announcements on the UMAC website is one of the main ways the UMAC Board communicates with the UMAC membership. During the reporting period 12 items were posted. The UMAC mailing list, hosted by the University of Strasbourg, is the other primary means of communication to 3886 subscribers representing both UMAC members and non-members. Over the reporting period 46 messages were posted.

WORKING GROUPS & PROJECTS

Teaching With Objects – Working Group

During the last year UMAC has made a major investment in the website content of the Universeum Erasmus+ funded project Teaching with Objects. This was an unbudgeted item in the last financial period. The UMAC Board considered it worthy of significant investment because of the opportunity of transforming the resource into a global pedagogy-supporting resource. Initial steps have been undertaken to form a joint UMAC Universeum Working Group to guide the development of the site and initiate further collaborative activities.

Future meetings of the Working Group will be held with the annual conferences of both organisations. The platform developed to carry TWO resources will require support from the membership of both organisations to keep expanding the availability of resources and develop a global community of practice. It will also require investment and there is a need for both organisations to collaboratively seek financial support both from within ICOM in partnership with other ICOM groups and externally from research and philanthropic agencies.

The UMAC Board recognises that the Teaching With Objects website needs integration with other UMAC resources. The new publication as part of the output of this new Working Group is noted above.

Two Horizons - Project

The Two Horizons project is a major multi-partner research project by UMAC looking at the integration of different epistemologies in the museum and higher education systems. It is linked with the decolonisation objective in our current strategic plan.

Resources to be made available on the UMAC website (including presentations, debates and publications) are being currently being compiled. There was no significant expenditure of project funds over the reporting period. In general progress on this project has been slow and funding has not been completely expended. This is a long-term project because it relies on partnerships between individuals, communities and institutions that must be developed slowly to ensure they are based on trust. This can take time with Indigenous communities.

The change in mandate at the end of this reporting period will provide the incoming Board to review the project and ascertain whether it should continue or whether unspent money should be returned to ICOM. Note: ICOM through the SAREC committee is reviewing its annual funding mechanisms for project work to allow finances to be tracked through multi-year projects. The new UMAC Board could consider continuing the project.

There has been initial discussion with members of the ICOM Asia Pacific Regional Alliance for the development of project workshops in the region in 2026.

Meanwhile research on different knowledge systems and their incorporation in university collections continues with the University of New England and the Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences.

A presentation on “Indigenous and Public Knowledge” was made at the Dresden conference; a presentation on “Two-way Museology: Museum Experiments in Epistemic Inclusivity” was made at the 17th International Conference on the Inclusive Museum. The paper “More than Museums: Care for Natural and Cultural Heritage in Australia” was published in Geoheritage.

A recent call for proposals for a thematic issue of the University Museums and Collections Journal was made, it has attracted 9 proposals at the time of writing this report.

UMAC Futures – Working Group

Zhao Ke currently Chairs this Working Group and has outlined the progress with the project in his report below.

Building Bridges - Project

Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza Varón currently directs this project and has outlined progress below in her individual report.

UMAC database - Project

In the first half of the current mandate we were not receiving requests to update the database, these requests were defaulting to previous Board Office Bearers. After this issue was rectified, we still received very few requests to update information on the database. This year a small subgroup of Board and non-Board members have conducted some experiments with AI on the data in the UMAC database.

There is currently a total of 3958 entries in the database and this number has been stable for some time (at least during the current mandate). From the AI experimentation it is apparent that much of the data is legacy data and the “Wikipedian” model of data acquisition is not keeping pace with changes in the higher education sector. A proposal for the future of the database is being developed.

Other activity

UMAC sponsored (non-financial) the online conference “International Congress of Culture in Climate Action 2024” held in December. A paper “The Unique Potential of the University Museum in the Anthropocene” was presented.

UMAC contributed the following article to PH Magazine, a periodical publication of the Andalusian Institute of Historical Heritage (IAPH); “Museos y colecciones universitarios: algunas experiencias globales en relación con el patrimonio académico”

Board member reports – Sian Tiley-Nel

UMAC-SA has participated in numerous engagements in 2025. UMAC was represented at the 89th South African Museums Association Conference (2-4 September 2025) in Pretoria, and I chaired a session on cultural heritage preservation and served on the paper peer review committee for the conference. Several cultural working group meetings took place as South Africa prepares to host the G20 Summit in November. An op-ed titled "How South Africa's universities can unlock the heritage within their museum collections" was published in The Star Newspaper on 21 September, marking Heritage Month.

Another important development in South Africa is that a new online heritage resource database known as SAHRIS, managed by the heritage authority of the SA Heritage Resources Agency, is plotting museums on a digital geographic map (this has not been done before), which includes listing and showcasing university museums and collections. This project is currently under development.

Membership overall remains steady, with the main universities in South Africa represented either as institutional members or individual members, including the University of Pretoria, University of the Western Cape, Stellenbosch University, University of Cape Town, and North-West University, as well as eight individual memberships. The UMAC emailing list has grown to 46. However, the representation on the UMAC Worldwide database for Africa has decreased to 14 listed universities, compared to 26 in the previous year. LinkedIn, as a professional platform, has expanded its reach to UMAC since its inception in November 2022, with many South Africans using and accessing the regular articles posted and reshared; this remains an important touchpoint for universities in the global south.

Board member reports – Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza Varón

During the 2022–2025 mandate, Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza Varón has actively contributed to the development and international visibility of UMAC through academic representation, research, and project coordination. Her work has focused on strengthening the connection between university museums and collections worldwide, particularly in the Spanish-speaking context. Below her main activities, publications, and initiatives carried out as an Ordinary Member of the UMAC Board are summarised.

Project - Building Bridges: University Museums and Collections in Spain and Latin America (2022–2025) The Building Bridges project, led by Margarita Guzmán (Colombia) and Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza (Spain) within the framework of UMAC-ICOM, was launched during the 2022 UMAC Annual Conference in Prague to strengthen the presence, visibility, and cooperation of university museums and collections from Spanish-speaking countries within UMAC’s international network. Since this launch it has formed part of the UMAC Strategic Plan’s (2022-2025) decolonisation outcomes. Its main purpose is to promote linguistic and professional inclusion, supporting especially smaller institutions that often remain on the margins of global museum dialogues. During this mandate, a first analytical phase was carried out in Spain and Colombia through surveys, interviews, and a research visit to Bogotá (Ibermuseos Grant, 2024). This study identified key challenges: lack of institutional coordination, limited collaboration among museums, and the need for resources and documentation in Spanish. As a tangible outcome, a dedicated Spanish-language section is being developed on UMAC’s website. This space is intended to host information, practical tools, and examples of best practices related to university museums and collections in the Spanish-speaking world.

The project remains ongoing, with plans to expand the network to other Latin American countries and to establish a permanent Spanish-language working group within UMAC, ensuring its continuity beyond the current mandate.

Related project activities

In March 2024, Ana Isabel Díaz-Plaza Varón carried out a field research project in Bogotá (Colombia) as part of the Ibermuseos Fellowship, visiting several university museums and collections (Universidad del Rosario, Universidad de las Américas, and Universidad Uniminuto). Publication Project

Title: IMAGINATIONS FROM THE FUTURES: Global Voices in University Museums

As part of UMAC's ongoing efforts to document global perspectives in the university museum sector, we have compiled interviews with 26 scholars from 22 university museums worldwide into a forthcoming publication.

- The focus of the book, younger voices, is in alignment with one of the major conference sub-themes at ICOM Dubai (Youth Power).
- Chair Andrew Simpson has been invited to contribute a foreword.
- The book (~100,000 words) will be officially published under UMAC's name and launched during the UMAC IC Day at the ICOM 2025 Dubai.
- The manuscript has been completed and is currently in the review stage, with all participants being contacted to confirm their consent and verify the accuracy of their contributions.
- We are evaluating publishing options—a funding-supported publisher has expressed interest, and discussions are underway with Chair Andrew

regarding whether to proceed with this partner or seek an international academic publisher.

- Once published, IMAGINATIONS will serve as both a historic record of UMAC's global engagement and a reflective resource on the evolving role of university museums.

UMuseum App

We raised the fund for 2025 maintenance of the UMuseums app. We raise the fund (about 4000 euros annually) to maintain the UMuseum app since 2019. We maintain the data and server of the app, and the installations in IOS app store and Android google play every year from all over the world.

New figures planned and tested in 2025:

Building on the consistent maintenance of the UMuseum app, we plan to integrate AI technologies to enhance its functionality and data accuracy. Key initiatives include:

- Implementing an AI-driven database to automatically discover new university museums and capture their exhibitions and events, with built-in verification of data authenticity.
- Establishing a continental data validation framework by recruiting one representative per continent, potentially from the UMAC Futures Working Group, to review and refine AI-captured information.

2. To co-organize an international workshop or seminar on OBL/OBT in China.

3. To promote the network of the UMAC FUTURES and recruit more members. We will foster an engaging atmosphere within the network, host more collaborative activities, and generate greater global interaction in UMAC community.

4. To maintain the IMAGINATIONS project. To make it more diverse and more inclusive. To edit the episodes different versions suitable for post on various social media and website.

5. To iterate the UMuseum app with AI-driven update. And to establish a continental data validation framework by recruiting regional representatives.
6. To coordinate and prepare the next Youth Forum/Seminar in Greece if needed.
